Project Manager's Report

Much has been happening over the first three months of the year. Pictured below are our new Grade 1 students with some visitors from the UK. Emma, a new expat in Chingola, has been doing voluntary work at ICCS helping to mentor the teaching staff. Emma brought her parents to visit the school; there was much excitement as Emma set the students the task of making UK flags - and there was a bit of a competition between classes as to which class could outdo everyone else!

The building work has progressed well, with the second classroom block completed in December. Grade 5 and 6 students moved into their new classrooms in January. The undercover area has proved very useful, especially during the rainy season! In January work commenced on the chicken runs (which are now complete) - ICCS will soon start raising its own chickens to help feed the growing number of students. An 'insaka' (gazebo-like structure) was built on top of the ant hill at the corner of the school plot, close to the chicken runs, which will be used for security, as well as prayer meetings and many other things. An outdoor undercover cooking area has also been built, with two big BBQ charcoal grills, two large braziers for the big cooking pots, as well as a tiled bench area for food preparation. This has been put into use this week, and should make an enormous difference to our cooking ladies, giving them more space and better facilities to work with.

After holding the school working bee in preparation for the new school year, we were given the disappointing news that the cholera outbreak meant that schools were to remain closed until further notice. It was God's provision that Veronique, a previous Chingola expat (who is completing a Masters in Teaching), was visiting from Australia and she quickly helped implement two weeks of staff development so that no time was wasted.

It was exciting to welcome our new staff members, Methuselah, an FCE graduate teaching our Grade 6 class, and Metrude, who has been teaching Grade 5 while Mary has been away. Fanwell has also now joined us as a general worker. Mildred's load has been increased to full-time and she is now doing remedial lessons for slow learners.

Another exciting development was the introduction of the dining hall - the third classroom is being used as a temporary dining hall until we have the funds to build a permanent one. This has brought much order and structure to the lunch time routine as classes are fed in two shifts of 90 students, and it has also helped us keep the classrooms cleaner!

Schools were allowed to resume on 22nd January and our Dedication Service was held on Friday 26th January, along with our first Overnight Prayer Service, which about 100 people attended. Thank you to Pastor Davison and Pastor Anthony and a team from one of the local Kasompe churches for their time and effort in leading the services. It was a wonderful night of blessing for all and there have been requests to make it a regular occurrence.

We were thrilled to award the ladies in our adult literacy group with their Grade 7 certificates; all who sat their national secondary school entrance exams last year passed!

This term our school gardens have provided many of the vegetables eaten during daily lunches - thanks to the hard work of Anthony and the parents who help in the gardens as part of their weekly duty roster. Towards the end of February, 'Women of Excellence' from Miracle Word Centre in Chingola generously came and planted about a dozen fruit trees on the school plot.

Recently we held our school registration days for our January 2019 intake.

The process of student registrations for the following year begins in January. During January and February, families come to the school to register the names, addresses and ages of their children with our social worker. These names are recorded in a book.

The cut off date is early March, and then the registration interviews begin. Each eligible family is given an interview day, and then the Zambian non-teaching staff and some volunteers spend about 20 minutes interviewing each family, asking a number of detailed questions about the family members, status of the child and his/her parents, siblings, living conditions, material possessions, number of people working, income, and so on. These questions are scored using a points system, and then those with the highest points are shortlisted to determine those most vulnerable. We have introducted a short basic aptitude test for the students to ensure they are ready for school. This year there are over 230 students on the waiting list.

Approximately 60 students are visited in their homes, to verify information. Information is checked and students may be visited a second time. Then the list is reduced to the final number of 30 students.

An enrolment day is held for these students mid-year when the child's photo is taken; and the parent or guardian signs an agreement form with the school, including items such as medical indemnities, parent volunteer roster, permission to take photographs, and so on.

The profile information and photo for each child is then sent to Australia, where a student profile is prepared, and the process of looking for sponsors begins.

Finally, late November, the students come in for uniform fittings, so they are ready to begin the new school year in January.



MANYANDO COMMUNITY SCHOOL, KITWE



The Ministry of Education has put emphasis on improving learners' reading abilities in schools, mostly through the provision of Continuous Professional Development in teachers.

In a bid to help the learners our partner, Book Bus, has been organising a range of workshops to develop literacy skills in the teachers so as to improve reading in the learners. With that done Book Bus then donated 'moving libraries' for use by both the teachers and the learners.

Though the target group was Grade 4 and 5, all grades are benefitting from the moving libraries.

The Book Bus is a moving library with hundreds of books on it. Just the joy of getting on the bus is exciting for the children and it gets more exciting for them when they are given the books to read.

By the end of the school year it is hoped that the reading abilities of most of our learners will have greatly improved.

Waterworks Challenge

During the month of March, our Australian Committee and several members of our Zambian staff spent a week drinking 'water only'. For some who rely on their daily morning coffee, this was quite a challenge. Thanks to many generous people, including the congregation of St Peters East Lindfield, and some wonderful families with young children who participated in the challenge in various ways, we have come pretty close to reaching our target, with over \$12,000 of \$15,000 raised so far (https://waterworks.org.au/page/zambia). Once we reach the target, we will be able to purchase a solar pump, 10,000L water tank and stand for our agriculture plot, which will enable us to grow more vegetables for the growing student population at ICCS.
