# Q & A with Cathy and Alan Barker regarding their visit to Zambia

#### Q: When did you visit Zambia?

I (Cathy) first visited Zambia in 2009 when B2B was trying to get a larger plot of land for the school, and both Alan and Cathy visited ICCS in June this year.

#### Q: What did you do on your recent trip there?

Alan, with the help of the male non-teaching staff, painted the 3 original classrooms inside and out, which took the whole 3 weeks we were there. Cathy helped by conducting literacy assessments with the students. It took 3 weeks just to assess all of Grade 5. The children were delightful to work



with. One day, we also went with Robyn and Mwaba to do some of the school shopping, which was a very time consuming and tedious job.

#### Q: Did you visit your sponsored child & how did you find that experience?

Yes, we visited our sponsored child, Natasha, in her home. We were very humbled by the conditions under which she lives. Some other families that we visited lived in much poorer circumstances and we felt a bit helpless, because no matter how much money we felt like spending to improve their lot, we knew that it would only be a drop in the bucket of need!

#### Q: What was the highlight of your trip?

Meeting Natasha, our sponsored child, and feeling like we had done something to help these lovely people, even though it was only a little. Also, the genuine appreciation of the local people that we had travelled all that way to visit and help.

#### Q: What benefits to the community can you see from the school?

Wow - how do you fit that into a few lines? The children, staff and family helpers are fed a nutritious meal at lunch time. The families are required to help with the cooking, cleaning and gardening at the school, which involves them in their children's education and that makes them happy. We saw how happy and well the children are and heard their lively involvement in the class activities. The children are watching the vegetables grow in the school garden plot, and eating some of that produce. They are involved in clubs, learning various other activities as well as their academic subjects. There is also a women's group that is involved in craft activities, and the women are learning skills that can help them earn some money. The adult literacy class will help them to improve their circumstances. All of this benefits the community they live in.

#### Q: How has your visit to ICCS changed you?

We are now more aware of what poverty looks like and how well off all Australians are, and it has made us think about what is important in life. We are more humbled by the fact that even in their poverty, compared to us, most of the families are happily getting on with their lives. What shocked us was the disparity between the haves and the have-nots, in such close proximity to each other.

#### Q: Can you give three tips for people planning to visit Zambia?

- 1) Be prepared to be changed, especially if you haven't seen poverty first hand before.
- 2) Try to learn some simple Bemba language "Hello, how are you?", "thank you" etc. Our efforts to speak their language were met with pleased faces and laughs. English is their main language but it won't hurt to learn a little of their local language.
- 3) Be aware of cultural expectations and aim not to offend.

- \* Thank God for all of his provision for Ipalo Christian Community School (ICCS) this year.
- \* Thank God for Amos Simfukwe and pray that his appointment will greatly benefit ICCS and take some of the load from Kim.
- \* Thank God for Robyn's help over the past two years and pray for meaningful future endeavours for her.
